Dark Waters follows Robert Bilott's (Mark Ruffalo) real-life legal battle against DuPont over the release of a toxic chemical into Parkersburg, West Virginia's water supply, affecting 70,000 townspeople and hundreds of livestock. Hoping to learn the truth about just what is happening, Bilott, with help from his supervising partner in the firm, Tom Terp (Academy Award®-winner Tim Robbins), files a complaint that marks the beginning of an epic 15-year fight — one that will not only test his relationship with his wife, Sarah (Academy

Award®-winner Anne Hathaway) but also his reputation, his health and his livelihood.







Two lost souls — one kicking her habit, one developing his own — befriend each other and grapple with the hard truths of addiction, in Joey Klein's exploration of the opioid crisis in Canada.

Across North America tens of thousands of people die every year as a result of opioid-related overdoses. Castle in the Ground, the latest from writer-director Joey Klein, places us in Sudbury, Ontario just as the crisis is taking hold.

Henry (Wolff) is the caretaker for his terminally ill mother (Neve Campbell). Henry's daily routine is to prepare his mother's medication by crushing up an OxyContin pill with a spoon, mixing it with jelly to dilute the heinous taste, and serving it to dull the intense and agonizing pain she's suffering through. Following his mother's death, Henry befriends his loud and troubled — yet charming — next-door neighbour, Ana (Imogen Poots). She's the only person in his life who isn't indulging his grief; she's simply there, across the hall, and trying to kick her habit just as Henry is developing his own. Together, they become tangled in the sordid web of indulgence that encompasses drug dependence.

In this unexpected comedy that crosses boarders and breaks boundaries, Salam is a charming 30-year-old Palestinian living in Jerusalem who works as an intern on a popular Palestinian soap opera, "Tel Aviv on Fire," which is produced in Ramallah. Every day Salam must pass through an arduous Israeli checkpoint to reach the television studios. He meets the commander of the checkpoint, Assi, whose wife is a huge fan of the show. In

order to impress her, Assi gets involved in the writing of the show. Salam soon realizes that Assi's ideas could get him a promotion as a screenwriter. Salam's creative career catches fire, until Assi and the soap's financial backers disagree on how the soap opera should end. Squeezed between an Army Officer and the Arab backers, Salam can only solve his problems with a final master stroke.

alongside the four other men who would become his brothers in music and who together made their mark on music history. Once Were Brothers blends rare archival footage, photography, iconic songs and interviews with many of Robertson's friends and collaborators including Bruce Springsteen, Eric Clapton, Van Morrison Martin Scorsese, Peter Gabriel, Taj Mahal, Dominique Robertson, Ronnie Hawkins, and more.

With venomous social media, resurgent authoritarianism and rampant narcissism threatening to trash civilization as we know it, the time has come for *Assholes: A Theory* — an entertaining and oh so timely feature doc from acclaimed director John Walker. Inspired by Aaron James' New York Times bestseller of the same name, Assholes investigates the breeding grounds of contemporary 'asshole culture' — and locates

signs of civility in an otherwise rude-n-nasty universe. Venturing into predominantly male domain, Walker moves from Ivy League frat clubs to the bratty princedoms of Silicon Valley and bear pits of international finance. Why do assholes thrive in certain environments? What explains their perverse appeal? And how do they keep getting elected!

"Styx" depicts the transformation of a strong woman torn from her contented world during a sailing trip. Maybe the defining ethical quagmire of our time is the refugee crisis, and the question of what we, as humans, owe in terms of aid and resources to those attempting to flee dangerous circumstances. These issues are powerfully explored in Styx, which is ominously titled after the mythical river that

separates us from hell. It begins with Rike, a German doctor enjoying a solo sailing holiday off the Spanish coast. When she encounters a slowly sinking boat packed with African refugees, she immediately calls the Coast Guard, who assure her they'll handle it and forbid her from interfering. But they don't show, and Rike's Hippocratic Oath is compelling her to help even though there are more refugees than could possibly fit on her sailboat. What should she do? There are no easy answers in Styx, which will haunt you long after its aching conclusion. (TCFF)

### Brotherhood

96 min., Canada 2019, Drama, English - Not Rated

Based on the harrowing true story that made newspaper headlines across North America in the 1920s, *Brotherhood* is a taut survival from a bristling piece of Canadian history. It tells the story of 11 teenage boys who lost their lives in a sudden summer storm on Balsam Lake in July 1926.
